National New Farmers of America, April 3-9, is a period that N. F. A. members throughout the country look to with pride, according to W. T. Johnson, assistant supervsion and national and state executive treasurer, with headquarters at A and T College Greensboro, N. C. The week in April which contains the fifth day in it (Booker T. Washington's birthday) is usually observed as N. F. A. Week, The main purposes are to inform the public with the activities of the organization and to keep alive the life and work of the late Booker T. Washington, who is considered by many as the father of Vocational Education. These students receive instruction in the scientific production, gradproducts; soil and water conservation; farm management; agricultural mechanics; farm and home improvement and beautification; and many other jobs that are needed around the home and farm.
