A&T Professors Receive Doctoral Study Assignments

Three assistant professors at A&T have been chosen to receive the U.N.C. Board of Governors' Faculty Doctoral Study Assignment Scholarship. They are Godfrey A. Gayle, an assistant professor in the Department of Plant Science; Japhet H. Nkonge, assistant professor, business and economics; Charles L. Evans, also an assistant professor, business and economics.

"This program came about as a result of legislation last year to give qualified faculty members in the traditionally Black institutions an opportunity to receive their doctorates because of a national shortage of Black instructors possessing this degree," stated Dr. Willie T. Ellis, assistant vice-chancellor for academic affairs.

Full-time faculty members from the 13 member University of North Carolina system (excluding UNC-CH) were eligible to apply for the scholarship. Each institution could select up to six candidates. After the candidates were selected, UNC president William Friday selected the finalists. "There was \$200,000 appropriated by the 1977-79 N.C. Legislature to finance the program," said Dr. Ellis.

"Priority was given to applicants with two or more years full-time teaching ex-

perience at their respective universities, but they had to agree to return to their home institutions for two years to compensate for each year spent studying for the degree," explained Ellis. A&T received three of the 16 appointments.

The faculty members selected for the doctoral study assignments began their studies at the beginning of this semester. While on assignment each member is still paid his regular salary and continues to be an employee of the university. All educational and personal costs associated with the assignments are paid by each individual.

"A program of this type is

good for Black institutions," said Ellis. "It upgrades teaching and research skills. These three teachers will become more competent to help students become better prepared to represent A&T and its faculty."

Each candidate attends an accredited university in a doctoral program. Gayle is pursuing his Ph.D. at N.C. State University in biological and agricultural engineering; Nkonge is seeking his doctorate in marketing at UNC-Chapel Hill, while Evans is working on his Ph.D. in marketing at Syracuse University in Syracuse, N.Y.

A second group of awards will be made this summer.

New Transportation Frat To Begin Chapter Here

A new chapter of a national transportation professional fraternity was chartered last Saturday at A&T.

A&T's transportation students were inducted in the Aggie Transportation Students United chapter of Delta Nu Alpha.

Eastern Airlines To Aid Students With TRIP Program

Black Collegian-Eastern Airlines, Inc. has developed a service to aid students traveling on corporate interviews. This service is called the Student TRIP Service.

TRIP, short for Travel Reservations Interview Program, is the service Eastern uses to issue airline tickets to students traveling for on-site interviews.

Here is how TRIP works: Once you are notified that you are invited for an on-site interview, simply call Eastern's Reservation Office and ask for

the Student TRIP Desk. (Be patient and persistent; this is not a well publicized service.)

Tell the reservations agent the name of the company that invited you, the company's address, the name and telephone number of the person that invited you. The reservations agent will call the company to confirm and issue you a non-refundable airline ticket. If the company does not offer you a ticket and if you do not have ready cash to pay for your ticket, this service will help you greatly.

liquor only late last year when Charlotte opted for mixed beverages.

But the pro-wet forces suffered a thumping turndown in nearby Alamance County, even as High Point and Greensboro voters were approving mixed drinks.

Burlington in Alamance County voted down mixed-drink sales by 3,849,361. And in the Alamance County town of Graham, the vote was 1,021 against to 552 for. The total Alamance vote was 10,007 to 6,552 on the dry side.

Greensboro had a 34 percent turnout of registered voters on the cold and snowy day. The final tally was 18,253 for to 8,359 against.

High Point's vote was closer—5,562 for to 3,983 against.

Pro-liquor forces in Greensboro and High Point predicted that Friday's votes would represent the beginning of a new era in convention trade and tourist development.

In Graham, Mrs. Lib Culp, executive director of the county board of elections, noted that Friday's Alamance vote was closer than the last one. But Mrs. Culp went on record as predicting the next vote in the county—which cannot be held, under law, for three years—also will see the issue fail.

Singers To Present Opera

Greensboro, N.C.—The Porgy and Bess Singers of New York City will present a concert version of George Gershwin's great American opera on Monday, Feb. 19, at 8 p.m. in the Richard B. Harrison Auditorium at A&T State University.

The program is open to the public without charge and is a feature of the university's lyceum series.

Composed of seven seasoned performers who sang in the Huston Opera Company production of "Porgy and Bess," this concert version brings the best parts of the Gershwin

music and the original script by Dubose Heyward to the stage. With costumes, lights and set, this production is designed to please a varied audience.

The Porgy and Bess Singers have just completed a successful fall of 22 performances for concert audiences in universities and cities in the Southeast and the Mideast, where they were very well received with high praise. Kenneth Hamilton who has the role of Porgy was outstanding.

"Porgy and Bess" is the name given to the opera by George Gershwin who used the play "Porgy" by Dubose Heyward as his libretto. The characters are based on real people whom Dubose and his wife knew in Savannah. Basically, it is a universal

theme of the power of love to transform; in this case a crippled beggar into a whole man and a prostitute into a loving wife.

The evening will include all of the important and familiar songs such as "I Got Plenty of Nothin'," "Summertime," "Bess, You Is My Woman Now," and "It Ain't Necessarily So" presented as they occur in the original opera so as to preserve as much of the story as possible.

Other hit tunes in the show include "Oh Lawd, I'm On My Way," "I Loves You, Porgy," "My Man's Gone Now," and "Strawberry Woman."

The cast will also perform selections from other Broadway musicals.

Root's '2' begins this week, don't miss it.

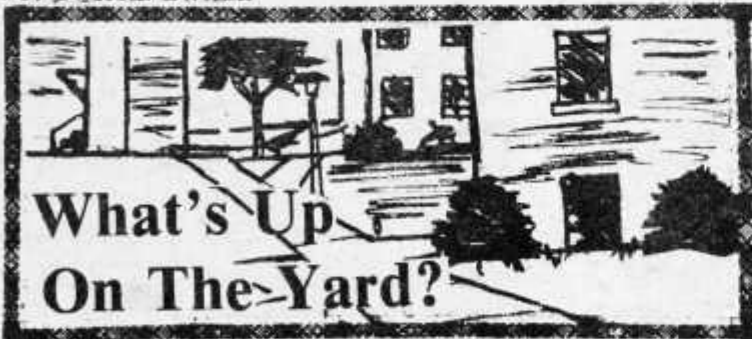

College Life, An Experience

So apply the right attitude toward your work, develop good study habits, and get remedial and tutorial help if you need it.

Black History

February 1, 1902 - Langston Hughes who is thought of as the "Black Poet Laureate," was born in Joplin, Missouri. He moved to Cleveland at the age of 14, graduated from Central High School there, then spent a year in Mexico before studying at Columbia University. While attending Lincoln University in Penn., the great poet won the Witter Bynner Prize for undergraduate poetry. Other awards

he received included Rowenwald and Guggenheim fellowships; and the Spingarn Medal in 1960. Hughes presented, in his colorful and vivid writings, his experiences gathered from travel to Africa and Europe. His works have been translated into more than 25 languages, including German, French, Hindu, Bengalese, and Spanish. This eminent author died May 22, 1967.

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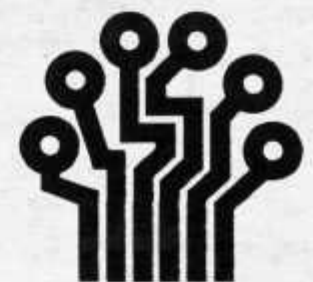
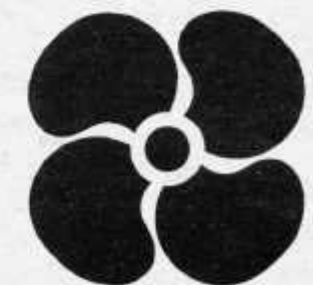
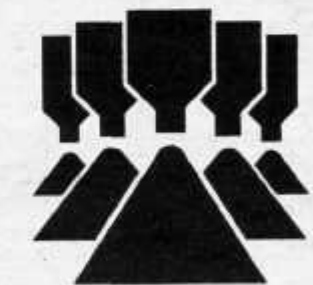

Brawner Gives 70-68 Victory Over Morgan

Joe Brawner connected on a 20-point jumper with three seconds left to give A&T a 70-68 win over Morgan State.

This conference win gave A&T its second straight MEAC regular season championship. The Aggies fell behind early as Morgan State took a quick 6-0 lead.

But with James Sparrow and Joe Brawner connecting on jumpers, the Aggies were able to catch Morgan and take a 39-31 lead at halftime.

Morgan was a little strong for A&T to handle inside as Garcia Hopkins and Anthony Young went to work scoring on easy layups.

With 9:39 left, Marvin Brown fouled out and this hurt the Aggies' rebounding strength as Morgan State out rebounded A&T 34-20.

Morgan State took the lead at the 6:38 mark as Hopkins, Young, and Byron Witherspoon led the rally.

Brawner tied the score with a free throw but Morgan State then took a four-point lead, 66-62. Morgan then went into their delay game.

Joe Brawner then made two consecutive layups coming from steals to tie the game at 66-66 with 2:57 left.

Morgan State missed on a

shot and Sparrow was fouled. After Sparrow's two free throws, the Aggies had the lead with 1:48 left. Morgan State tied the game at 1:28 to set up Brawner's shot.

On Brawner's late shot, Littles said: "People look for us to go to Sparrow or Pipkin in pressure situations but I like to see Joe Brawner take the shot as much as anybody else. He's the point guard. He had the ball. He was having a great night and I'm glad his last shot was a good one."

Brawner's 29 points led A&T in scoring, while James "The Bird" Sparrow contributed 19 points. Morgan State was led by Anthony Young and Garcia Hopkins with 22 and 19 points, respectively. Byron Witherspoon pulled down 10 rebounds to lead that category for Morgan State.

Guards Charlene Henderson and Karen Bryant teamed with forward Lillie Pratt to lead the A&T Aggies to a 71-62 victory over the Eagles of NCCU. The trio combined for 25 second-half points to lead A&T to its third straight victory.

The score at the half was 35-22 with the Aggies leading. The team built that lead to 43-34 with a basket by Henderson and two by Bryant. The Eagles went on a 9 to 2 spurt to cut the Aggies' lead to two at 45-43.

Bailey said the fact that the educators have worked in private industries aids them in their teaching efforts. He concludes that, "these individuals are not only proven teachers but proven researchers as well."

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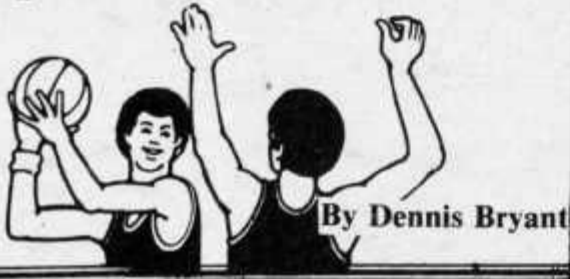


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Sports Notebook



In the last edition of the A&T Register, one of the reporters did an article on Improvement in Women Sports. There is a lot of criticism as to what the athletic director said.

Early in the week, the NCAA told the officials at Michigan State that it had to spend as much money on the women sports as the men's sports. There was a 30 to one ratio of men to women funds that was spent on sports.

There has to be some kind of investigation to look into the situation here at A&T. The A&T Aggies (the former name of the women's team) does not get the money it deserves for recruiting. Last year, A&T got one recruit for women's basketball and two for men's basketball.

One may ask or say, "Maybe it is because there were not any women to recruit." But this has to be wrong. There are over four-hundred women basketball teams in the state and thousands more in the country. In North Carolina, there are thirty teams that have better than a 17-3 winning record.

Last year there were three players in this state that wanted to attend A&T. These same players are on three of the top teams in the area, one of those being South Carolina State College.

How can A&T expect to improve its sports program when there seems to be no system of recruiting.

If there is a system to recruit, then why doesn't A&T get any top woman athletes in North Carolina or any other state? If these are over 50 percent of the females on scholarships, why not get some of the top women in the state? How many of the men are on scholarships? If the figure is over 50 percent, maybe the NCAA should look at A&T.

The four women sports offered at A&T may have the same facilities, but what about funds? There was nothing mentioned about an equalization in that category. I have been at A&T for four years and right now I don't see any fall scholarship females. Try to count the men.

The time to look into this situation is now. If a woman has the choice to attend A&T on a partial scholarship or to attend High Point on a fall scholarship, where do you think she will go? A&T hasn't got a place to have the athletes as does Carolina or State, but they could afford two or three fall scholarships for some really good talent each year for women sports.

In conclusion, maybe we all should look at Title IX. There isn't any equalization. It's true there are more women on this campus than men. There are 30 or more new scholarships each year for the football team, basketball team and maybe baseball.

These 30 do not include the ones already on scholarship. Now let's count the number for the women. Have you counted 30 yet or 20, maybe even ten? This isn't just true for the women sports, but for the men's wrestling and track teams.

There may be just too much emphasis placed on football and basketball scholarships. Where is the money for the wrestling team to get home matches or for the track team to get any matches? Where is the money that Title IX is supposed to be using in each school to up women programs? Maybe the athletic director can answer these. The questions have to be dealt with sooner or later.

22-Foot Jumper Upsets A&T

Carlton Richardson connected on a 22-foot jumper with 10 seconds left to play, to lift Howard University to a 66-65 upset victory over A&T.

Howard, playing its most inspired basketball of the season, came out firing long range jumpers over the Aggies' tight zone. The game was tied at 13:12 of the first half, 10-10 as Carlton Richardson and Louis Wilson both sank a couple of jumpers for the Bison.

The Aggies surged ahead 20-13 with 10:10 left in the half on two consecutive three-point plays by Marvin Brown and Joe Brawner, a jump shot by James Sparrow and a layup by Brawner coming from a steal by Marvin Brown.

Howard continued to fight back and, after a 25-foot jumper by Louis Wilson, A&T's lead had been sliced to three, 23-20.

Sparrow found a hot hand by connecting on six-points as A&T had its biggest lead, 33-22 with 3:45 left.

Again Howard fought back by scoring the last six points of the half as A&T seemed to have fallen asleep. The halftime score was 33-28, A&T, but Howard had all the momentum.

The Bison came out hot in the second half. Louis Wilson consistently hit shots outside the Aggie zone and with 17:33 left, the Bison had a one-point

lead, 36-35. Marvin Brown put the Aggies back on top with a layup and after Tyrone Edwards' three-point play, the Aggies led with 40-36.

Both A&T and Howard shot poorly in the contest. The Aggies shot a horrible 35 percent while Howard shot 41 percent.

Howard controlled the boards, out rebounding A&T 47-35.

This loss dropped A&T to 10-1 in the conference with one conference game left with the Eagles of NCCU in Greensboro. Howard is 5-5 in the conference and 13-10 overall.
