# The New Farmers of America

The New Farmers of America is the national organization of, by and for farm boys studying vocational agriculture in public secondary schools, which operate under the provisions of the National Vocational Education Acts. It is an educational, non-political, non-profit, farm youth organization of voluntary membership, designed to develop agricultural leadership, character, thrift, scholarship, cooperation, citizenship, and patriotism. The N.F.A. is an intra-curricular part of vocational education in agriculture in the public school system of America. It constitutes one of the most effective devices for teaching through participating experiences.

This organization had its beginning in Virginia in May 1927, when the New Farmers of Virginia chapters held their first State meeting and convention at Virginia State College, Petersburg.

The organization has grown rapidly to over 900 chapters, and membership of nearly 35,000 during the past seventeen years and is recognized as the largest Negro farm boy organization in the world. National headquarters are maintained in the Agricultural Education Service of the Office of Education, Federal Security Agency.

The National Organization has become an important factor in the development of the New Farmers of America, and has grown not only in membership, but has each year improved its program of helping farm boys to better prepare themselves for citizenship and life on the farm.

# FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA FOUNDATION, Incorporated

The Future Farmers of America Foundation was incorporated under the laws of the District of Columbia on March 29, 1944. The By-Laws were adopted by the Board of Trustees at a special meeting in Kansas City, Missouri, October 7, 1944.

The Foundation was established to provide business, industrial, civic, farm and service organizations and individuals with an opportunity to cooperate in furthering the programs of the Future Farmers of America and the New Farmers of America.

The Foundation annually provides on a nationwide basis prizes and financial awards to deserving members of the F.F.A. and N.F.A. who have achieved distinction in their supervised farming programs, scholarships, citizenship and rural leadership.

Foundation funds are administered by a Board of Trustees of fifteen members, nine of whom are State Vocational Agricultural leaders democratically elected at regional conferences to represent the various States. Six members are from the staff of the Agricultural Education Service of the Office of Education, Federal Security Agency. An Advisory Committee, which meets for one day each year with the Board of Trustees, is composed of one representative from each of the donors to the Foundation.

A steady growth in interest and participation in the Future Farmers of America Foundation, Inc., has been evident since its inception, as illustrated by the fact that 120 donors are listed in 1951 whereas only 68 were listed in 1950.
